1. Statement of intent

Skipton Girls' High School ("the School") is a designated state funded, 11- 18 single sex school which allocates places based on selective academic ability.

The school is committed to prioritising places for girls within the Craven area of North Yorkshire.

As an Academy, the School's Local Governing Body is responsible for setting the School's admissions arrangements, under the devolved responsibility from the Northern Star Academies Trust Board.

2. Admission of student into Year 7 (prior to the start of Year 7)

2.1 Number of places

The planned admission number (PAN) for entry into Year 7 is 120. The Governors will plan to admit girls who have reached the required selection test standard up to this limit.

2.2 Selection Tests

For eligible candidates (see Explanatory Note 1) the School will set selection tests for entrance into Year 7. These will consist of two separate tests in:

- Mathematics
- English

A candidate may sit the selection test only once in the academic year.

Late applications will only be considered after the date in March when places are allocated. If there are places available, testing will be offered. These will take place in the May preceding the September of admission.

Parents/Carers who wish their child to take the test, must complete the School's registration form. Failure to complete the School's registration form will result in the candidate not taking the test.

A parent/carer may appeal against the decision of the Governors not to offer an assessment or a place, to an Independent Admissions Appeals Panel appointed under the prevailing Government legislation. The decision of the Independent Admissions Appeals Panel is binding on the Governors and on the parents/carers.

2.3 Priority Area

The school gives priority to applications from girls living in the priority area who have been deemed suitable in the selection testing, although it is anticipated that a number of places will be available for girls beyond this area. A map of the priority area can be found on our school website.

2.4 Admission Criteria

Once the tests have been marked parents/carers will be informed whether their child has been deemed suitable and can be considered for admission.

Reaching the standard does not guarantee that a place at the school will be made available; if more girls are deemed suitable than there are places then the over-subscription criteria will be used to determine which girls will be offered places.

Pupils with a current Education, Health Care Plan issued by a Local Authority, which names the school, and who have been deemed suitable in the admissions testing, will be offered a place. The number of available places will be reduced accordingly.

2.5 Oversubscription Criteria

If more pupils than there are places for are deemed suitable in the School's selection tests, after the offering of places to pupils with a current Education, Health Care Plan which names the School, the following oversubscription criteria will apply:

1. Places will be offered to looked after (*see definition below) and previously looked after girls who have been deemed suitable then;
2. to those who at the time of application are registered as Pupil Premium and eligible for Free School Meals or who have been registered for Free School Meals at any point in the last 6 years (**see definition below) then;
3. to those girls living within the School's Priority Area who have been deemed suitable then;
4. to those girls living outside the School's Priority Area who have been deemed suitable

If there are not enough places for all the girls in one of these priority groups, we, the School, will then offer places to those living nearest school

Distance measurements are based on a straight line from home to the School, as measured by an electronic mapping system. Distances will be measured from the front door of the home to the main School entrance on Gargrave Road. Where more than one dwelling shares the same front door (for example, in a block of flats) the distance will be measured from the front door of the building as a whole. In the unlikely event that two or more children live in the same block and in all other ways have equal eligibility for the last available place at the School, the names will be issued a number and drawn randomly to decide which child should be offered a place

If the School is over-subscribed for entry into Year 7 a waiting list will be kept ranked according to the oversubscription criteria above from the date when places are offered until the 31st August, the end of the academic year of admission. If a place becomes available during this period, we will offer it to the waiting list using our Admissions Policy criteria. No waiting list will be kept after this date. Every time a girl is entered on the waiting list it will be ranked again in accordance with the oversubscription criteria.

* a 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or special guardianship order including those who appear [to the admission authority] to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).

**Children attracting Pupil Premium are those who have been registered for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the 6 years prior to the closing date for registering for the test. The school will require evidence of Pupil Premium registration and reserves the right to withdraw the offer of a place if the offer has been made on the basis of an incorrect, fraudulent or misleading application. Parents of children attracting Pupil Premium must have ticked the Pupil Premium box when registering their child for the test. Parents will need to provide evidence of Pupil Premium registration to the school no later than the end of the September. Any evidence received after this date will be considered as late and will only be considered after the main round of allocations has been made.

3. Co-ordinated Admissions Arrangements

The School is required to comply with the North Yorkshire Co-ordinated Scheme for secondary school admissions to Year 7 (See Note 3). Under this scheme only one offer of a school place will be made by the home Local Authority for admission to any secondary school including the School. Parents/carers may express a number of preferences for admission to all maintained secondary schools and academies. The priority in which parents/carers express their preferences will be used to determine which one offer is made.

Application for selection testing is NOT the same as making an application for a place at the School. This must be done through a local authority coordinated admissions scheme. For girls living in North Yorkshire this will be done via North Yorkshire Local Authority ("the Local Authority"), but for girls living outside North Yorkshire it must be done via the local authority in which the girl lives. A place cannot be offered at the School unless the School is named on the Common Application Form, even if the girl has been deemed suitable in the test.

4. Summary of the application process for the admission of students to Year 7 prior to the September of the Year 7 admission

1. The registration form to take the School Selection Test must be completed and submitted by the School's closing date in early September. The information on the deadline for application is available in the School's Admissions Handbook. The Handbook and the accompanying registration form are available from the School or on the School website. This applies both to girls living inside the School's Priority Area (see attached map) and those living outside the Priority Area.
2. Registration forms received after the closing date will only be considered after the date in March when places are allocated. If there are places available testing will be offered. These will take place in May preceding the September of admission.
3. No girl will be able to sit the test unless a registration form has been completed.

4. The selection tests will be held in the school in the Autumn Term of Year 6.
5. The tests can be taken once only in the academic year.
6. Parents/Carers will be informed whether their child has been deemed suitable for admission. This information will be released sufficiently before the closing date (normally the end of October) for the return of the Local Authority Common Application Form. We advise that parents/carers wait for this notification from the School before completing and returning this form.
7. Parents/Carers submit the Common Application Form. Parents/Carers who wish their child to be considered for a place at the School must list the School as one of their preferences.
8. Parents/Carers will receive notification of allocations from their Local Authority following their published scheme. At the same time in the Spring Term the School will also post offers of places to successful candidates.
9. Parents/Carers will be required to confirm to their Local Authority, within 14 days, if they do not wish to accept the place offered.
10. Parents/Carers whose child has been offered a place at the School will be asked to confirm their acceptance of the place within 14 days. Failure to accept within 14 days may result in the offer of a place being rescinded.

5. Admission of students after the start of Year 7

The planned admission number of 120 applies to all years.

Assessment of suitability for the School for prospective entrants after the start of Year 7 is arranged using tests produced by the School in English and Mathematics. These tests are based on national curriculum content appropriate to the age group. Each of the tests lasts for one hour.

Such assessment will only be carried out for an individual once in any academic year. Dates will be published on our website from 1st May for the subsequent academic year. We do not normally admit into Year 11, however, exceptional circumstances may be taken into consideration by the Governors' Admissions Committee.

If one or more places are available, and more students taking the assessment reach the required standard than there are places available, then oversubscription criteria outlined above will be used to determine which applicants are offered places. If the school is oversubscribed in that year group, then a waiting list will be kept ranked according to the oversubscription criteria above until the 31st August at the end of the academic year of admission.

A parent/carer may appeal against the decision of the Governors not to offer an assessment or a place, to an Independent Admissions Appeals Panel appointed under the prevailing Government legislation. The decision of the Independent Admissions Appeals Panel is binding on the Governors and on the parents/carers.

6. Admission into Year 12

Entry into Year 12 for girls who have completed Year 11 elsewhere is welcomed. There is a target figure of 35.

There is no limit for students who have completed Year 11 at Skipton Girls' High School but all applicants, internal and external, must meet the academic entry criteria for the courses which they wish to take.

These academic criteria, along with the closing date for applications, are published annually in the School's Sixth Form Prospectus, and are available from the School on request.

If one or more places is available, and more students taking the assessment reach the required standard than there are places available, then the oversubscription criteria outlined above will be used to determine which applicants are offered places. for such applications.

If more external applicants meet these academic criteria than there are places, then the oversubscription criteria above will be used.

A parent/carer may appeal against the decision of the Governors not to offer a place, to an Independent Admissions Appeals Panel appointed under the prevailing Government legislation. The decision of the Independent Admissions Appeals Panel is binding on the Governors and on the parents/carers.

7. Explanatory Notes

1. Eligible candidates are those children who have reached the age of 11 in the preceding academic year between 1st September and 31st August. Applications for girls whose dates of birth fall outside these limits will be considered at the discretion of Governors only in exceptional circumstances.
2. Any address used must be a permanent residence, defined as owner occupancy or a long-term letting contract of at least 12 months of a residential property where community charge is paid.

In the case of a recent change of address, the documentation required may include the following:

- Proof of exchange of contracts or a signed tenancy agreement, minimum of 12 months.
- Utility bills.
- Driving licence/car insurance documentation.

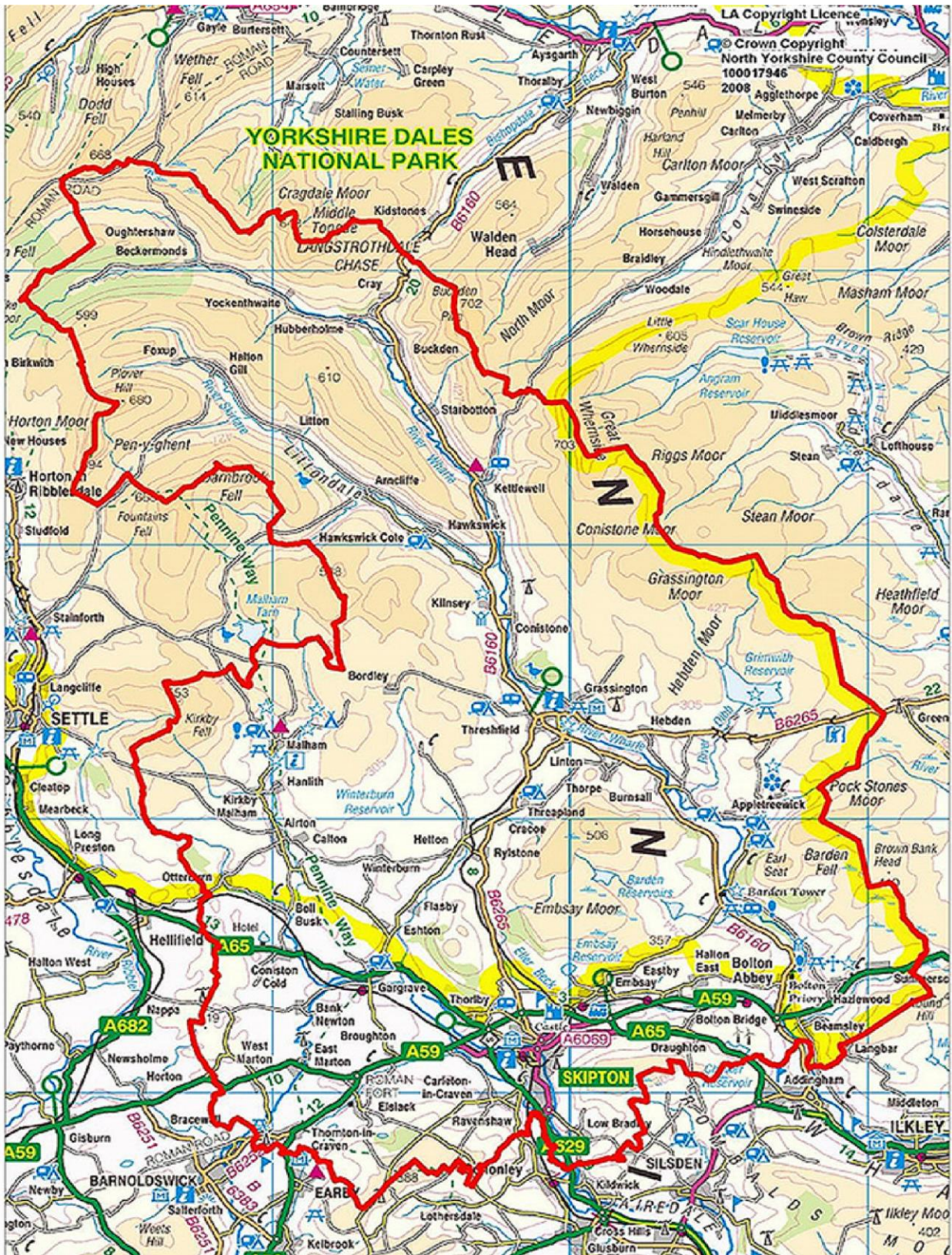
Where a girl lives with one parent/carer for part of the week and the other parent/carer for the rest of the week, only one address may be used for the application. This must be the child's principal residence from Sunday to Thursday.

Families whose first home is outside the Priority Area will be deemed to live outside the Priority Area.

An offer of a place may be withdrawn if it is subsequently discovered that it was offered on the basis of a falsely claimed or dated address.

3. Details of North Yorkshire's Co-ordinated Admission Scheme may be found in the publication "A Guide for Parents" issued by North Yorkshire to parents/carers of Year 6 pupils early in September, which is also available at www.northyorks.gov.uk/admissions. Parents/carers of children who live in other local authority areas should obtain details of their own local authority's scheme.
